Students join forces to create toys for hospital

Special education, technology students collaborate on designs for children

Penn Manor High School students recently made a special delivery to children at Pediatric Specialty Care Hospital – a collection of colorful toys they designed and built in an unusual collaboration between students who normally would not work together.

The Pediatric Toy



Project paired students in a technology/applied engineering course with learning support students for an opportunity to create toys to benefit children with significant medical challenges.

Working in teams, the Materials Design students shared their design and building knowledge with their peers to create safe, colorful, stimulating toys based on guidelines provided by the hospital, which sent a representative to meet with the students during the design phase.

The building materials mostly included plywood and Plexiglas that was purchased with a \$500 Venture Grant from Penn Manor Education

The toys had to use nontoxic materials and include no sharp edges, with

soft-close lids and other safety features. They also needed to be stimulating to

Penn Manor Education Foundation is a proud supporter of Samaritan Counseling Center's TeenHope program, which provides emotional wellness screenings to all ninth-graders at Penn Manor High School.

The program, which just completed its fifth year, screens students for depression, anxiety and other emotional concerns to identify teens who could benefit from further evaluation and treatment.

The program has fostered a culture in which mental health issues are openily discussed in a supportive environment.

PMEF awarded a \$1,000 grant to Samaritan this past year under the Strong & Healthy Families program in support of TeenHope.

years as a civilian working for the Navy Department in Washington, D.C.


After retirement, he returned to Lancaster County in 2017.

No two students are alike. They have varied talents and interests, and when they're passionate about something, they can accomplish amazing

Students also can experience very different challenges in arriving at graduation.

Two recipients of Penn Manor Education Foundation scholarships this year are examples of the diversity of the students impacted by the education they receive at Penn Manor and the financial support PMEF provides so they can continue their education.

Raj Bhattarai and Bahu Chauhan both received Dr. Jan Mindish Scholarships to support them as they begin the next steps in a journey that began in Nepal.

Raj came to America in 2014, attending McCaskey High School before transferring to Penn Manor in January 2017.

He worked hard to be a top student in the electro-

mechanical engineering program at Mount Joy Career & Technology Center, where he had perfect attendance and was on the National Technical Honor Society and Distinguished Honor Roll.

Raj was named Outstanding Student in his program and received the Inspirational Student award from the faculty.

In addition to developing his job skills, Raj says he has "learned to be an independent person who doesn't give up easily and learns from his mistakes."

Bahu's journey began in a refugee camp in Nepal, where she collected sticks and bottles from the trash to buy pencils and erasers to use for her schoolwork.

After arriving in the United States in 2010, she struggled with the language, but worked the through challenges, graduating at the top of her class in the nursing assistant Brownstown program at

Advancing learning for all students

Penn Manor students designed and built children's toys, planted vegetable gardens at their schools and improved their musical skills with electronic "tutors," thanks to Venture Grants awarded this past year by Penn Manor Education Foundation.

The Foundation awarded 52 grants totaling nearly \$50,000 to 47 teachers – all record numbers. The projects covered a wide range, from \$38 for plant mazes for second-graders at Central Manor Elementary School to \$4,800 for toolboxes for Penn Manor High School Agricultural Mechanics students.

The grants also funded books, news magazines, light tables, field trips, digital photography equipment, therapeutic games and mindfulness training sessions.

Manor Middle School received a \$2,000 grant for training a therapy dog, Wrangler, to help calm students in distress. And the district's counseling department received a \$2,500 grant to implement mental health programs.

In all, the grants enhanced the school climate and learning experience for hundreds of students at all 10 Penn Manor schools.

Here are highlights of this year's projects:

LEGO Bricks and Physical Science, Marticville

The grant paid for 15 sets of Lego simple and powered machine sets to be used in science classes. The kits will provide a hands-on opportunity for students to learn how simple machines can affect the energy and force needed to complete a task.

Teaching with SmartMusic HS/Marticville/Manor

The music department purchased software that enables students to use their laptop computers to record, practice and evaluate music as they play their instruments, providing immediate feedback from an electronic "tutor."

Making Physics for Everyone, Penn Manor HS

The grant funded sensory equipment and software to be used in science labs to study momentum, energy and conservation properties. The materials will enable more hands-on experimentation and data collection in Physics, Forensics and Principles of Science classes.

Enhanced Lab Equipment for Biology, HS

The grant was used to purchase electronic balances, hot plates and magnetic stirrers to be used in biology labs to enable more students to study enzyme activity in fruit, chemical reactions and other STEM-based lab exercises.

Science Classroom Manipulatives, HS

The grant paid for prepared slides of human tissues that will enable the biology department to offer a more diverse microbiology curriculum that includes current research in the field of biology.

Pediatric Toy Design, HS

The grant funded materials for a collaborative project involving Materials Design and Learning Support students, who designed, tested and built toys tailored to the needs of pediatric hospital patients. Students also delivered the toys to the children.

Resident Therapy Dog Manor Middle School

The grant funded formal training for Wrangler, a therapy dog that is assigned to the middle school to assist students throughout the day. Wrangler is owned by the school counselor and helps calm students experiencing, anxiety, anger and other emotional challenges.



Electronic Percussion Project, PMHS

The grant paid for an electronic drum sampling pad to be used in place of other instruments, including timpani, drums and chimes, to serve as a musical "Swiss Army knife" for music classes and marching band and percussion ensemble performances.

Opportunity for Live Theater, Central Manor

The grant funded an educational field trip to Lancaster City historic sites and a theater production at the Fulton Opera House, a National Historic Landmark. Many students who attend this Title I school would not otherwise get this opportunity.

Community Garden Extension Project, Central Manor

The grant paid for a series of activities throughout the year to expose students to hands-on science lessons through gardening. Activities included a fall garden cleanup project, spring planting, late spring harvest and after-school gardening programs.

Re-Establishing a Community Garden, Conestoga

The grant funded materials and expertise to rebuild the school's community garden, which was lost to a reconstruction project in the 2016-2017 school year. The



grant also supported establishing a cafeteria waste composting project at the school.

Supporting Students with Mental Health Concerns Manor Middle School

The grant funded "calming tools" designed to help teach students experiencing emotional difficulties to self-regulate their emotions. The materials include mindful games, therapeutic coloring books, fidget toys, therapy putty and tablets equipped with calming apps.

Sensory Materials, Conestoga

The grant funded a collection of sensory materials for use by students struggling with sensory stimulation issues, including a growing number of pupils on the autism spectrum. The materials include squeeze toys, stress balls, weight lap pads, balance seats, isolation headphones and other devices designed to calm students.

Venture Grant projects for 2017-2018

Nook Reading Resources, Conestoga Elementary

The grant enabled the school to add 10 Nook tablets, which were loaded with books (both guided reading and pleasure titles) to help special-education students practice their reading. The goal was to better integrate the students into regular-education classrooms.

Learning with Happy Atoms Manor Middle School

The grant funded Happy Atoms, a digital and physical chemistry set that allows students to visualize complex molecules. Students will build single and double bonds and free electrons using magnetized parts



and compare them to digital representations of atoms and molecules.

Light Tables to Enhance Kindergarten Classes, Eshleman

Light tables were added to kindergarten classrooms for students to use while practicing letter formation, sight words, math skills, measurement and geometric shapes.

Wellness Works in Schools, HS

The grant funded workshops for special-education and gifted students with academic and behavioral needs on mindful awareness skills and self-regulation strategies. Students focus on emotions, intentions, personal goals, resiliency and problem-solving skills to help them better handle their personal challenges at home and in school, work and community settings.

Breakout EDU Kits Hambright, Manor and Marticville

Several Breakout EDU Kits were purchased for use in classrooms and libraries. The kits encourage students to problem-solve in ways that encourage movement, collaboration, self-regulation, conflict resolution and critical thinking.



Education on the Move, Eshleman

The grant funded a collection of manipulatives for students to use to incorporate more movement into classroom instruction. The materials include agility ladders, jump ropes, beach balls, poly spots, bean bags, buckets, playing cards and other items to be used on all grade levels.

A Novel Idea, Central Manor

Novels and teacher manuals were purchased to enhance the sixth-grade curriculum.

STEM in the Library, Penn Manor High School

The grant paid for makerspace materials, including programmable robots, building materials and a drone, for use by students in the high school library. Students work at their own pace or in collaboration with others to achieve project objectives.

Transforming Independent Reading, Hambright

The grant funded an expanded collection of books for four sixth-grade classes to encourage independent reading.

Connecting Content and Literature, Hambright

Nonfiction books were purchased for kindergarten students on such topics as citizenship, family, neighborhoods and the sciences.

Operation Digital Professional Art Production Suite, HS

The grant funded professional-quality digital cameras, printers and software to support updates in the curriculum for photography and commercial art classes, expanding opportunities for



students to utilize digital resources.

Multi-Tiered System of Support in the Classroom Letort/Central Manor

The grants paid for student practice materials and software to help students enhance their independent math skills.

Time for Kids Subscriptions, Conestoga

Subscriptions to print news magazines, digital and video materials were purchased for 180 students in grades 1, 4, 5 and 6.

Penn State University Sea, Air and Land Challenge, HS

The grant paid for materials and fees for a team of students to enter the competition, which challenged them to design, build and operate a drone programmed to perform specific tasks that replicate a real-world response to emergency situations.

Kindergarten Chair Pockets, Conestoga

The grant funded storage pockets that are attached to desks to help students become better organized.

Flexible Seating Hambright /Conestoga

The grants funded exercise balls, an Adirondack chair, camp chair, wobble cushion, yoga mat and other alternative seating materials for secondand third-grade classrooms. The chairs provide options for students who have difficulty sitting still.



Social/Emotional Programs to Support Student Mental Health, districtwide

The grant funded workshops for students on all grade levels on making positive choices, stress and anger management, online safety and other topics.

The program is integrated into the health classes that all ninth-graders take. The screenings are voluntary, but most students participate.

If the screening indicates concerns, parents are contacted and provided with resources and a referral to a mental health professional for counseling. If parents allow it, high school counselors also begin to work with the student.

Counseling can be provided by Samaritan or other providers.

Another major component of TeenHope is educating students about nurturing their own mental health and educating teachers so they can respond when a student comes to them for help.

"The physical education and health teachers are key to this because they teach a mental health unit, they talk to the students about the stressers in their lives and the screening, so it's a natural part of the curriculum," said Melissa Ostrowski, Penn Manor High School counselor.

"Just like you get your height, weight and vision checked, you take care of your mental health," she said. "It's keeping mental health as part of the everyday conversation, and hopefully it's identifying some students who we otherwise may not have realized were in need."

TeenHope has helped reduce the stigma surrounding mental

health issues, according to Ostrowski. "To students, this is just another way that we take care of ourselves," she said.

The program was designed to build a school culture in which mental health issues are openly discussed in a supportive environment, said Gerald Ressler, Samaritan Counseling Center exectutive director.

Samaritan administers the program and provides the team of counselors that screens hundreds of students each semester.

Grant funds wifi hotspots for students

More Penn Manor students will have access to the internet at home thanks to the generosity of the Fulton Family Foundation.

The organization funded a \$2,040 grant through PMEF's Strong & Healthy Families program to purchase four portable internet hotspots for students to use after school hours.

While most students have wifi at home, a small percentage do not. Nearly 40 percent of district students are economically disadvantaged and qualify for free or reduced-price lunches.

As a district, Penn Manor has tried other programs to get internet to these students, including free wi-fi at local churches and schools, but they have not been successful.

This grant will enable students to borrow a hotspot overnight, free of charge, from the high school library.

The devices provide a wireless connection, allowing students to access websites, Google Drive and class information from home.

The district's social workers will assure that the gear is made available to the students who need it.

the senses, with distinct textures and sounds, bright colors and recognizable shapes.

"The project gave all the students a new experience they would not have gotten without this project," said Alisha Gerhart, who teaches the Materials Design and Production class. "It brought two groups of students together that normally would not be in the same course."

Gerhart collaborated with learning support teacher Michelle Wagner to

oversee the project.

Over several months, students designed, built, tested and painted their toys before delivering them to the Lancaster pediatric hospital on March 1. They got to interact with the children and staff members – an unforgettable experience for many.

Children at the hospital are receiving care for traumatic injuries, birth defects, genetic disorders, chronic diseases and other medical conditions.

"This experience has allowed me to appreciate what I have in my life," said student Mitchell Martin. "These kids don't get to go home every day and be with their families. The experience that I had to give these kids joy with the toys that we made is a once-in-alifetime thing, and I was glad to be a part of it."

Student Kayla Hansen also was touched by the experience.

"Knowing that we will put a smile on those kids' faces is the reward for our time and effort put into this project," she said.

Gerhart said the class was a great learning experience, on many levels.

"This was an incredible opportunity for students to problem solve, work collaboratively, and do good within the local community," she said.

Literacy Outreach book distribution expands

Project funded by Strong & Healthy Families

More than 200 books are now in the hands of children thanks to a Literacy Outreach program funded through the Strong & Healthy Families program.

In late May, Penn Manor administrators and social workers distributed books to children of all ages in the Pheasant Ridge and Manor Heights communities to encourage the youngsters to continue reading over the summer.

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PM students win Sea, Air & Land Challenge

Grant funds first-year high school effort

Congratulations to the team of Penn Manor High School students who placed first in the Sea, Air and Land Challenge, held in April at Lancaster Lebanon Intermediate Unit 13.

Moses Buckwalter, Graham Thomas, Maxwell Kreitzer,

Wesley Kendig and Thomas Hockenberry - all freshmen - won the air portion of the competition, which required teams to design, build and fly

drones over a simulated wooded area and release materials on targets.

The exercise was designed to simulate an aerial response to a forest fire.

Each team had a \$500 budget to purchase a drone and controller and modify it for the competition. The Penn prepared and conducted

Manor team used computeraided design to create new motor mounts, landing gear, a payload mechanism and other components, which came to life via the 3D printing process.

During the competition, team members had to explain

> their project to judges before flying the course. They were judged on the accuracy of their flights and payload drops, the durability of their designs

and a preliminary design report.

To cover the cost of materials and entry fees, the Penn Manor team received a \$600 Venture Grant from Penn Manor Education Foundation.

'The team was well-

themselves in a professional manner at the competition, impressing not only us coaches but also the judges," said Jonathan Zimmerman, a Penn Manor High School gifted teacher who served as the team's adviser.

Since December, he worked with the students during homeroom and after school, with the assistance of Dan Yocum, a Penn Manor parent who served as team mentor.

"I am amazed at the

ingenuity and ability of this team to overcome numerous challenges and learn new technology concepts in such a short period of time," Zimmerman said.

This is the first year Penn Manor has participated in the competition, which is sponsored by Penn State's Électro-Optics Center in collaboration with the Office of Naval Research Program.

Quite an impressive firstyear effort!
